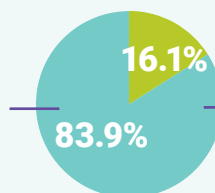

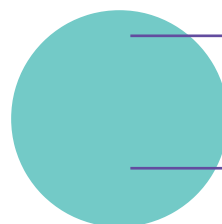

RECEIVED A TRANSPLANT IN 2021.**



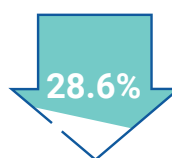
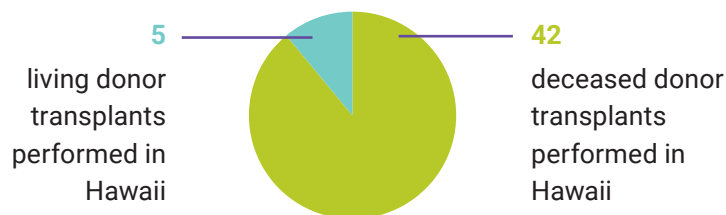

## Health disparities in kidney failure

KIDNEY FAILURE HAS A DISPROPORTIONATE IMPACT ON PEOPLE OF COLOR. COMPARED TO WHITE AMERICANS, THE LIKELIHOOD OF DEVELOPING KIDNEY FAILURE IS:

3.4×

greater for Black Americans

1.9×

greater for American Indians

1.3×

greater for Asian Americans

1.5×

greater for people of Hispanic/Latino ethnicity  
than people of non-Hispanic/Latino ethnicity.

## Why people with kidney failure need financial assistance from AKF:

Kidney failure is a disability. Dialysis is life support. Treating kidney failure and its comorbidities is more consuming than a full-time job: more than **80%** of people on dialysis cannot work.

Hawaii residents on dialysis and living with transplants received grants from AKF in 2021 to pay for their insurance premiums and other health care-related costs not covered by insurance.



\$1,923,957

in charitable assistance from AKF ensured that low-income Hawaii dialysis and transplant patients could afford their lifesaving health care in 2021.
