- Walk us through your journey with kidney disease. Start with when your experience with kidney disease began and go up to where you are today.



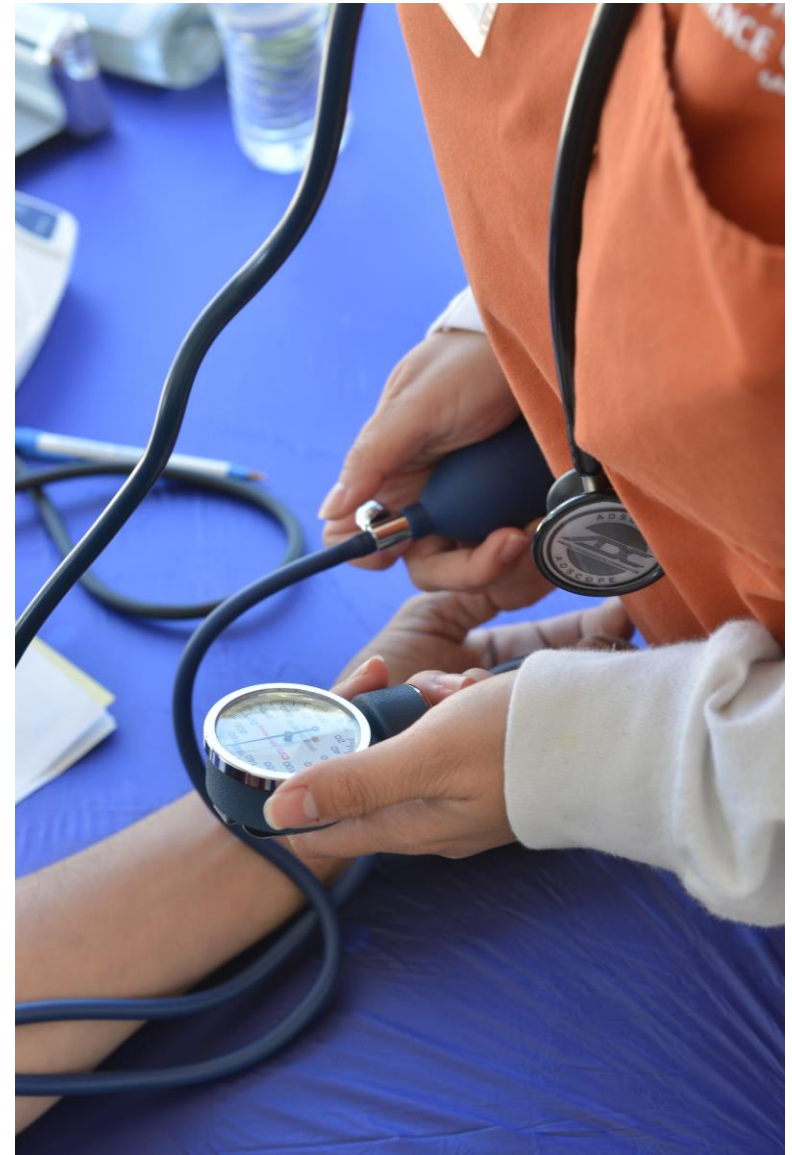
- When do you think the ‘switch’ happened when you started taking an active role in your health care?

- We know that dialysis center staff are stretched thinly. How can you make the most of the little time you have with them?

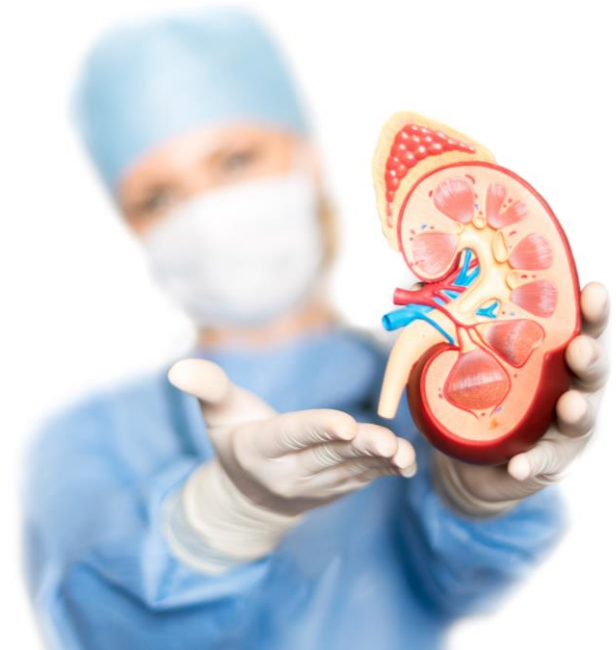
- Kidney patients are unique because they often have to coordinate their health care with several different doctors. Was this ever a challenge for you, and how did you overcome it?

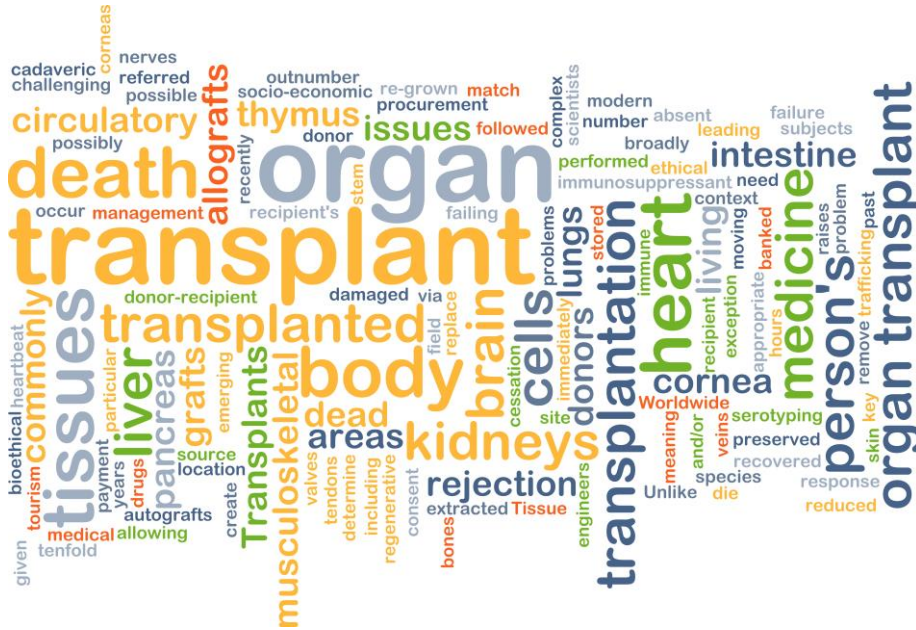


- If you could give advice to a nephrologist or dialysis nurse about making patients feel more comfortable, what would you recommend?



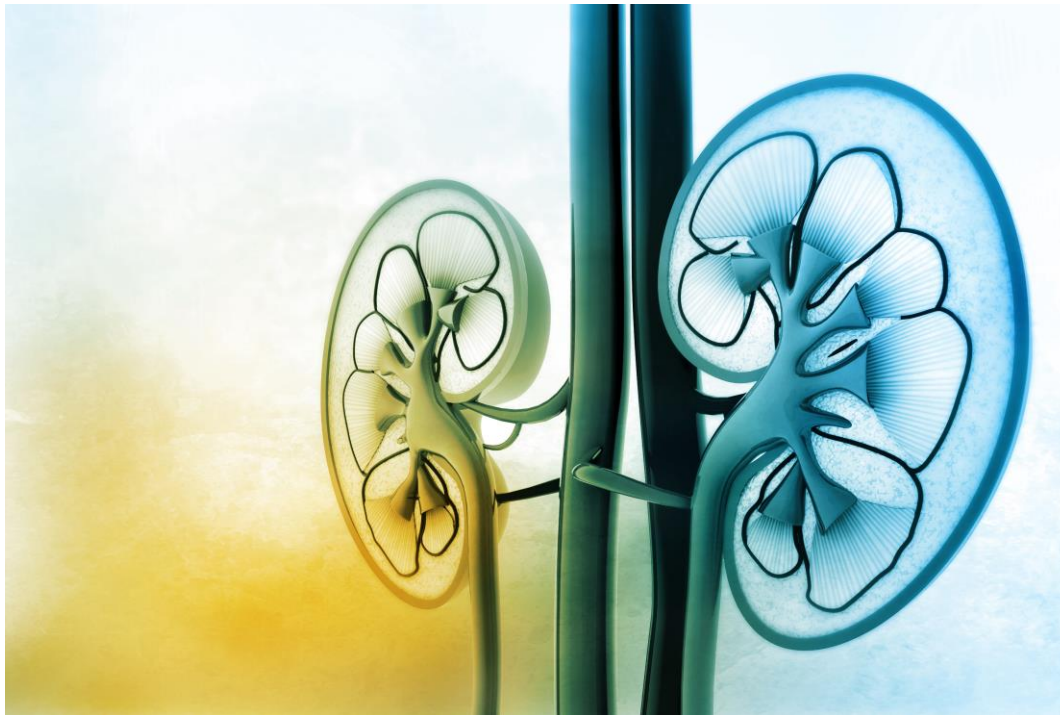
- What was your experience with getting listed for a transplant, and then eventually receiving a kidney transplant?
